

Business Talk: Frank Rahlf from Daria US

I am greeted with a warm "Welcome!" by Mr. Rahlf himself, who awaited me in the conference room on the second floor of a building one might confuse for something that came straight out of an industrial <me machine but was taken over by some high-tech, almost Star-Wars-esque robot invasion (the previous owner of the office). But even as I make my way up to the elongated and brightly lit space our interview's gonna take place in, I am also greeted by many smiling faces, one warmer than the previous one.

Warmth. Perhaps not a direct value, but definitely a feeling you get walking into the Daria US building on Hendry Street for the first time.

Winston: First of all, thank you for taking the time to meet with me today. I have to admit, I can hear a little bit of an accent – are you originally from Germany?

Rahlf: Yes, that's right. I was born and raised in Germany, and even after many years abroad, a bit of the accent always stays with you.

Winston: I think it gives the conversation character, and of course, it ties in perfectly with the fact that Daria is a German-American company. So let me start with something that many people might be curious about: what was the real background, the motivation, behind moving to Florida and starting this immense project? Seems like a big decision to make.

Rahlf: Well, that is fairly simple to answer. The reason why

I moved to Southwest Florida was - surprisingly - not the sun shining so often here. I also did not move here for the truly magnificent and fascinating nature – I'm sure there are animals and creatures a German might never imagine to see in his life that I see daily in Florida, truly a privilege! Clear waters, beautiful beaches, etc.. That is the Florida charm I always enjoyed – for all 35 years that I've been visiting before I finally moved. But no, it was not for that. The biggest and most important reason is that the people here are just so friendly and open and kind. You just feel very welcome and at ease when you're here.

Winston: Exactly my thoughts start... when I came into your office!

Rahlf: Goal accomplished! Something else I love about Floridians is that you can buildcontact very easily, because the people are very heartily and always ready to help you out. But to answer your question briefly: The people were the most important reason for me to start daughter. Daria US and consequently also start my life here in Florida. And now that we've achieved that, we want to give back to the people of Florida in exactly the same way and with the exact same kindness they treated us with. This is very important to us. In Germany, we say: "Es liegt uns am Herzen". It means it lies at our heart, I feel like that envisions how important it is to us.

Winston: Absolutely. German is such a beautiful language, I am now noticing. So many warm and feeling words! Mr. Rahlf, just when you were talking about your company's mission of giving back, I couldn't help but wonder, where and how exactly did Daria US start? And also: Daria sounds familiar in a way. Do you mind telling me more about how you came up with that?

Rahlf: Of course! And also, Anna, please, call me Frank.

Winston: Noted.

Rahlf: Now, where did it all start...

For a moment, it seems like the world had gone quiet. I just knew there was something so exciting and inspiring to be told in that very room I was sitting in, and I would have the privilege to hear it firsthand.

Rahlf: Let's start with my daughter.

I open my eyes wide.

Rahlf: This is Daria.

He shows me a picture of a dark-blonde girl smiling widely at the camera with dimples at the mouth and eyes sparkling from joy. Probably a picture taken on a family vacation.

Rahlf: Daria. She is, together

with my beautiful wife Viktoria, the most important person in my life. That is why we chose to name the company after her. And also because the name is so melodious and beautiful. I am very happy that my partner Patrick Lauber and I were able to decide on this particular name because it makes running this company all the more special for me. But there's also a little story to it.

See. I told you so.

Rahlf: In 2022, after we were able to visit the States again – that is after Covid-19 –, we boarded a plane with a wild group of twenty friends in Germany and went to Florida. Then and there we decided: "We want to build something right here.". Not everyone had the financial resources to engage in the project with a big investment right away, so we decided to create a solution based on Fractual Ownership. That means, to put it simply, multiple people in our friend group were able to build a house together here in Southwest Florida. We just thought it was a great solu<on and started professionalizing it, which now turned into one of the most modern investment models currently available in the real estate sector. Very flexible and especially suitable for those who wish to engage in real estate but do not yet have enough money to afford their own home, with or without support from a bank.

Winston: With that kind of a starting point, I can imagine that there has to be some kind of value-based spirit at Daria. What would you say, what does Daria US stand for?

Rahlf: You see, Daria is actually more of a community than it is a standard company. We have clear rules of how we interact with each other here at Daria US and have built a philosophy which carries our day-to-day operations as well as our long-term goals. That is why it is crucial for us to act within the values we have internalized in our community. Those are: Trust. This is a major one, we have to trust one another here as much as we can. Supporting each other. Being responsible. Doing what's best and then more for everyone who is part of our community but also everyone who isn't. We have made it our philosophy to communicate and bond on a positive level with any of the people we get in contact with. We have made it our philosophy to not generate success at the expense of others. The success we have achieved so far and the success we are 100% sure to achieve in the near future comes from things that we know will help other people as well. A further core value of ours is: family. Daria US is a family in itself. But even more so, we are a family-oriented community, which means that the support of families and especially children and young adults on their lifepath is of very high importance

Winston: And why didn't you just create a community to get something started together?

Rahlf: The background to this is actually very simple. We are convinced that the foundation for freedom is economic independence. That's why one of our main goals is to achieve economic independence for each individual, each member within our community.

Winston: So the focus is both on community for its own sake,

and on creating financial foundations for independence?

Rahlf: Exactly. Florida, and especially the opportuni<es here, are par-cularly well-suited for this. This is partuclarly true for Fort Myers and Cape Coral – an incredibly beautiful area with enormous potential that we want to help bring to the surface. We are proud to have our headquarters here in Cape Coral and Fort Myers. Our aim is to contribute to making this region even more successful and attractive. That is why we do everything with the clear intention of connecting it directly to the economic independence of our members.

Winston: So in the end, is it really just about real estate? Is Daria US essentially a development company?

Rahlf: Daria is, again, much more than a real estate company. Real estate is, to some extent, a means to an end – helping each individual to become economically stable and, in the medium term, economically independent.

Winston: So property is more of a tool rather than the whole story?

Rahlf: Correct! Beyond real estate, we are ac-vely crea-ng service companies, restaurants, and entertainment concepts. The goal is to provide a qualita<ve addition -and in some areas even an improvement - to what the market currently offers. We have set ourselves the standard of only pursuing projects if we can deliver them at an exceptionally high level of quality. Over time, we decided to es-

tablish independent business solutions in a variety of sectors. So far, this has worked out very well, and we are genuinely proud of it. Our team continues to grow month by month, and that growth is clear proof that what we are doing is being successfully received and embraced.

Winston: And how do you see the growth of the company in the future? Do you have enough manpower to actually make all this happen?

Rahlf: In fact, we are already working with both German and American employees in many areas today, and we are continuing to expand all sides of the businesses. Anyone who is interested in becoming part of our community - whatever the role may be – can apply. On our website, people will soon be able to see which posi<ons are open.

Winston: So there are currently opportunities available for people who want to join?

Rahlf: Absolutely. I think it's a great chance to find a very interesting job and the opportunity to become a leader and entrepreneur yourself, whether you're younger or older. As I mentioned, we truly welcome every application, and every applicant will eventually have a conversation with us.

When I leave the headquarters later that afternoon, I take with me not only the impression of an innovative business but also of a truly German-American company, one that builds bridges in culture as much as it does in innovation, commerce, and quality of life. Daria US doesn't just want to employ

people and help entrepreneurs; it wants to discover where their true strengths lie and help them find a space which fits those strengths like a glove - because, as mentioned by Frank Rahlf during our interview, "Every person can be a firework of creativity, productivity, and happiness if they find themselves in the right position.".

It's a philosophy that echoes in every corner of the office: the careful effort to find the best possible match between a person and their role, so that motivation, joy, and success can thrive naturally. 

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From Village Savings to a Global Movement: The Origins of Credit Unions in Germany and Canada

On a cold winter night in 1900, a small group of working families gathered in the parish hall of Lévis, a modest town across the St. Lawrence River from Québec City.

They were not wealthy merchants or bankers. They were shopkeepers, farmers, and laborers people who lived paycheck to paycheck, often forced to borrow money at ruinous rates just to make it through the season. That evening, under the guidance of journalist and reformer Alphonse Desjardins, they pooled their meager savings into something entirely new in North America: a caisse populaire, or people's bank.

It was a modest start—just \$26 in deposits from a handful of neighbors-but it marked the birth of the first credit union on this side of the Atlantic. For the families present, it was an act of hope: it was proof that ordinary people could take control of their financial lives. For the movement as a whole, it was the seed of an idea that would cross borders, reshape communities, and eventually give rise to the credit union system that millions of Americans belong to today.

Yet to fully understand that moment in Québec—and why credit unions resonate so strongly across North America—we must travel back a half-century earlier to rural Germany, where the movement's true origins lie.

Germany in the 19th Century: Banking for the Forgotten

The mid-1800s were years of profound change in Germany. The Industrial Revolution had brought wealth to some but left vast stretches of the population behind. In villages and small towns, farmers, artisans. and laborers found themselves locked out of traditional banking. With little collateral and irregular income, they were deemed too risky for loans. Their only recourse was local moneylenders who charged crippling interest rates, trapping families in cycles of debt. It was into this world that two reformers, Friedrich Wilhelm Raiffeisen and Hermann Schulze-Delitzsch, stepped forward.

Raiffeisen, a deeply religious mayor in the Westerwald region, was haunted by the poverty he saw among farmers. His solution was rooted in Christian charity and collective responsibility. In the 1860s, he began organizing Rural Credit Cooperatives where neighbors pooled their savings to extend loans to one another. These cooperatives were bound together by trust and solidarity—if one member defaulted, the community absorbed the loss. Schulze-Delitzsch, a lawyer and politician, operated in more urban settings. He championed People's Banks for artisans and shopkeepers, emphasizing democratic control, self-help, and economic education.

Unlike Raiffeisen's faithbased cooperatives, Schulze's banks were explicitly secular and leaned on the Enlightenment values of rationality and civic responsibility. Though their philosophies diverged, their institutions shared key

credit unions today. Firstly, member ownership: Depositors were not just customers; they were stakeholders with equal say. Democratic governance: One member, one vote, regardless of wealth. And lastly, community focus: Profits were reinvested locally rather than siphoned to outside investors.

By the late 19th century, Germany's cooperative banks numbered in the thousands. They offered more than credit; they offered dignity, giving working people access to fair financial services for the first

Crossing the Atlantic: The Canadian Adaptation

Half a century later, across the ocean, another reformer took notice. Alphonse Desjardins, a journalist in Ottawa and clerk of the Canadian House of Commons, had spent years reporting on financial struggles among ordinary Canadians. He was particularly outraged by cases where families were ruined by usurious lending practices. In one instance, he discovered a laborer saddled with \$5,000 in interest on a loan of just \$150—a debt trap that shocked even seasoned politicians.

Desjardins began studying European cooperative models, poring over accounts of Raiffeisen's and Schulze's experiments. But he also understood that any North American version would need local adtightly knit Catholic parishes and traditions of mutual aid, offered fertile ground.

So in 1900 on that fateful winter evening, Desjardins founded the Caisse Populaire de Lévis, North America's first credit union. His innovation was not only institutional but cultural. Unlike German cooperatives, which were often tied to secular or Protestant traditions, Desjardins anchored his credit union movement in Catholic social teaching. Parish priests frequently served as leaders or advocates for caisses, and the language of thrift, morality, and solidarity resonated deeply with Québec families.

Desjardins was tireless. Over the next two decades, he traveled extensively, helping to found more than 200 caisses populaires across Québec and parts of Ontario. He also turned his eyes southward. French-speaking immigrant communities in New England, struggling with the same financial hardships as their Canadian relatives, invited him to share his model.

In 1909, with Desjardins' guidance, St. Mary's Cooperative Credit Association opened in Manchester, New Hampshire. It became the first official credit union in the United States, setting the stage for a broader American movement.

What Made Credit Unions Different

At their core, these German

of finance. Traditional banks measured value in collatermeasured it in trust and community.

They were inclusive, designed for people who had been systematically excluded from mainstream finance. They were democratic, ensuring that no single wealthy member could dominate decision-making. They were sustainable, recycling local savings into local loans, strengthening the very communities that supported them. These qualities gave credit unions a moral resonance that extended beyond financial services. In both Germany and Canada, joining a cooperative was not just an economic decision—it was a declaration of solidarity. Members weren't merely clients; they were co-owners, responsible for one another's welfare.

Why This History Still Mat-

More than a century later, it may be tempting to see credit unions as simply another financial option, differentiated mainly by lower fees or higher savings rates. But their roots remind us that they were born in times of deep inequality and financial exclusion.

The German farmers of the 1860s, the Québec families of 1900, and the Franco-American immigrants of New England aptation. Québec, with its all faced a common dilemma: traditional institutions had left them behind. Their response was not resignation, but invention. They created something new-financial institutions that belonged to them, answered to them, and served their collective needs. That DNA remains visible today. When credit unions in the U.S. talk about "people helping people," they are echoing Raiffeisen's vision of rural solidarity and Desjardins' dream of mutual aid. When boards emphasize democratic elections or member dividends, they are carrying forward principles first articulated in German villages and Canadian parishes over a century ago.

A New Series on the American Story

This article opens a series that will explore how those European and Canadian ideas took root in the United States and evolved over the decades. Future installments will trace:

- The role of immigrant communities in spreading credit unions across the Northeast.
- The legislative breakthroughs of the 1930s that gave credit unions legal recognition.
- The ways credit unions navigated challenges from banking competitors, regulatory changes, and economic

principles that still define and Canadian experiments • How digital transformation, fintech, and globalization are challenged the prevailing logic reshaping the cooperative model in the 21st century.

> By revisiting the origins of credit unions in Germany and Canal and profit. Credit unions ada, we gain perspective on why these institutions matter. They were never intended to be just another set of banks. They were, and remain, instruments of empowerment—tools that communities forged for themselves when no one else would help. As we look to the future of American credit unions, that history provides not only context but also inspiration. Just as German villagers and Canadian parishioners once did, today's members are called to imagine what finance could look like if it placed people, rather than profit, at its heart.

The Ryder Cup Myth

Drama, passion and team spirit: Why the Ryder Cup electrifies the golf world every two years!

Then the best golfers from Europe take on the best from the United States, a golf course transforms into a stage for raw emotion, fierce rivalry, and unforgettable moments: the Ryder Cup. Every two years this prestigious showdown takes place, alternating host sites between the continents. In 2025, America's Bethpage Black will turn into an arena where not only birdies and putts matter, but also nerves of steel, unity, and national as well as continental pride.

"There's nothing like it," raved Rory McIlroy. "When you celebrate with eleven teammates, it feels a hundred times more intense than winning a Major on your own." Tiger Woods, who has represented the U.S. multiple times, once stressed: "Here, you don't play for yourself – you play for your country and your continent. That makes the pressure unimaginable." Words that capture the unique essence of the Ryder Cup.

A Competition with Tradition

The Ryder Cup was founded in 1927, named after British businessman Samuel Ryder, who donated the silver trophy. Initially, it was the U.S. against

Europe: Record win came in 2004 under Captain Bernhard Langer: 18½–9½ at Oakland Hills – still the heaviest U.S. home defeat.

Great Britain, later joined by Ireland. In 1979, the team was expanded to "Europe" to break American dominance – a decision that turned the Cup into one of the most dramatic sporting events in the world. Since then, the U.S. and Europe have traded victories, with nearly every edition writing its own dramatic story.

Spanish legend Seve Ballesteros, who shaped the competition like few others, once said: "The Ryder Cup is not a normal tournament - it's war, in a sporting sense." His passion and fighting spirit made him, especially in the 1980s, a lasting symbol of the European team.

The Match Format

The Ryder Cup uses the match play format. Players or pairs compete hole by hole. Winning a hole puts a player "1 up". If the lead grows, it becomes "2 up", and so on. If opponents tie a hole, no points are awarded. With 18 holes, a match can end early if a player is mathematically unbeatable - for example, "4 & 3" means four holes ahead with only three remaining. Matches can also end in a tie, with each side earning half a point.

Friday & Saturday: Two sessions per day (morning and afternoon). Each session has four matches, all in pairs. That means only 8 of the 12 players per team are active at any one time. Captains' pairings and tactics are crucial – chemistry often beats rankings.

Morning: Foursomes (alternate shot), widely considered the toughest format. Two golfers play one ball alternately.

Afternoon: Fourball (best ball), where each golfer plays their own ball and the better score counts.

Across Friday and Saturday, 16 points are up for grabs.

Sunday: 12 singles matches, worth 12 points total.

That makes 28 points overall. Europe, as the defending champion, needs 14 points to retain the Cup, while the U.S. needs $14\frac{1}{2}$ to win it back.



Why the Ryder Cup is Unique

Unlike traditional golf tournaments where silence reigns, the Ryder Cup is a cauldron of noise. Fans in blue-and-gold or red-white-and-blue chant, cheer, and boo. "The first tee at the Ryder Cup feels like the Super Bowl – only you're all alone over the ball," explained Justin Rose.

The Americans often set the tone with fiery talk, while Europeans strike with quieter but just as powerful words. Ahead of 2025, U.S. captain Keegan Bradley made it clear: "I've been doubted my whole (...) life. That's when I do my best work. We are gonna go to Bethpage to kick their (...)."

Traditionally, there was no prize money - players competed for honor and history alone. But in 2023, Team USA controversially introduced a \$200,000 appearance fee per player (donated to charity). European captain Luke Donald countered: "I asked all 12 guys in Rome what they thought. Not one of them even considered playing for money. That's not what this event is about. We know what we're playing for – and that's enough."

The Cup thrives on team spirit in a sport built on individuality. As Sergio García put it: "When you know ten guys

have your back, you automatically give a little more."

But the pressure is immense. Even Scottie Scheffler, world No. 1, faltered in 2023, earning just one point from four matches. His 9&7 foursomes loss with Brooks Koepka against Viktor Hovland and rookie Ludvig Åberg was the heaviest defeat in cup history.

Ryder Cup 2025

This year's venue: Bethpage Black, Long Island, New York - one of the toughest courses in the world with narrow fairways, deep bunkers, and lightning-fast greens. "This is no place for the faint of heart," said former U.S. captain Zach Johnson.

Team Europe: Veterans like Rory McIlroy and Jon Rahm, paired with rising stars.

Team USA: Anchored by Scottie Scheffler, Jordan Spieth, and Collin Morikawa.

The Ryder Cup is more than a tournament. It's a celebration of passion, rivalry, and sporting drama. It proves that golf can be loud, emotional, and bigger than any individual. Or, as Jack Nicklaus once said: "The Ryder Cup shows us that golf is more than just a game - it shows us what it means to be part of something greater."

Sunshine Post Recipe of the Month: Key Lime Cheesecake

October is here! The cozy season of the year when we all love to treat ourselves. While pumpkin and apple are the classic staples of any autumn dinner table, our Key Lime Cheesecake brings a refreshing twist. The combination of zesty lime, silky cheesecake, and a crunchy crust makes it a true showstopper for any fall gathering. It's easy to make ahead and chill overnight. Join us in making a dessert that feels just right on both sunny fall afternoons and cozy evenings.

INGREDIENTS (for a 9-inch springform pan)

For the crust:

- 2 cups graham crackers or butter cookies, crushed (we used Animal Crackers)
- ½ cup melted butter

For the filling:

- 2 cups Greek yogurt
- 1 cup cream cheese, room temperature
- 2 egg
- 3/4 cup sugar (or 1/4 cup Monk Fruit sweetener for a sugar-free version)
- ¼ cup all purpose flour (if the filling isn't thick enough)
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoon lime juice
- Zest of 2 limes (Key Limes if available)
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

For the topping:

- 3/4 cup heavy cream
- 1 tbsp powdered sugar (or ¼ tbsp powdered Monk Fruit sweetener for a sugar-free version)
- Lime slices or zest for garnish

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Mix the cookie crumbs with melted butter. Press firmly into the base of the springform pan and chill for 15 minutes.
- 2. Beat filling ingredients until smooth (if needed in a blender). Add the eggs one at a time. Stir in lime juice and zest.
- 3. Pour the filling over the crust. Bake in a preheated oven at 325°F (fan) for 50–55 minutes. Let it cool slowly in the oven with the door slightly open.
 - 4. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours, ideally overnight.
- 5. Whip cream with powdered sugar or sweetener, spread over the cheesecake, and decorate with lime slices or zest.

SUNSHINE POST TIP

Add a pinch of cinnamon to the crust mixture! It pairs beautifully with the fresh lime and gives the cheesecake a subtle autumn touch.
